# Notes and Solved Textbook Questions

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### CHAPTER SUMMARY

Swami, a boy in the second form (7<sup>th</sup> standard), usually slept in the same room as his grandmother.

One day, his father read a newspaper article about a boy who bravely fought a tiger. Wanting Swami to be courageous, the father made Swami sleep alone in his office. His father ignored the protests of the mother and grandmother.

Swami was scared of sleeping alone in the dark.

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i. Swami slept under the bench for safety and covered his head with a blanket. His heart beat faster in fear.

ii. Silence in the house deepened.

iii. A ray of light from the streetlamp cast shadows on the wall.

iv. There were noises of the clock ticking, trees rustling, people snoring, and insects humming.

v. Frightening stories about devils and ghosts that Swami remembered:

a. His friend Mani who had seen the devil under a banyan tree.

b. Munisami's father spitting blood because the devil slapped his cheek.

c. His fourth-class friend who disappeared suddenly and was said to be taken by a ghost to Siam or Nepal.

Swami fell into a restless and nightmare-filled sleep. He had nightmares of:

- A tiger chasing him.
- The noise of the tiger claws scratching the ground and a loud thud.
- His feet stuck on the ground unable to escape.
- His eyelids not opening and being unable to escape from the nightmares.

Swami woke up and heard something rustling and saw a dark shape moving. Thinking it was the devil coming to take him and hurt him, Swami hugged the body and bit it with all his might.

Swami had actually bitten the leg of one of the most notorious house-breakers in the district! Hearing the noises, Swami's father, the cook and a servant rushed in and caught the burglar.

Swami was congratulated in the following ways:

- i. His classmates looked at him with respect.
- ii. His teacher patted his back.

iii. The Headmaster said that Swami was a true scout.

iv. The police were grateful to Swami.

The inspector suggested that Swami become a police officer when he grew up, but Swami wanted to be an engine driver, a railway guard or a bus conductor.

Swami went back to sleeping with his grandmother. His father was displeased but didn't make him change his sleeping arrangements again.

### 1. A report about a boy in the newspaper was an unexpected event in Swami's life. Justify.

**Answer:** In the story A Hero, by R K Narayan, Swami's father read a story of a brave boy who faced and fought a tiger. Thinking Swami needed to be more courageous, his father forced Swami to sleep alone in the office. Swami's night was filled with nightmares and scary memories. He bit down on the leg of a dark presence thinking it was the devil. It turned out to be a burglar however, and Swami had accidentally helped capture a notorious housebreaker of the district. Swami's bravery received congratulations from the police, his schoolmates, teachers and the headmaster. He went back to sleeping beside his grandmother and his father accepted his decision. Thus, the report about a boy in the newspaper started a series of reactions that led to an unexpected event in Swami's life.

# 2. Swami made a comment on the newspaper report. Was he right? How did his view differ from that of his father?

**Answer:** After hearing about the newspaper report, Swami commented that it must have been a strong grown up who fought off the tiger. #### 7. Narrate Swami's dreadful experience when he was lying under the bench.

**Answer:** Swami was terrified of sleeping alone. When he lay on the bench, he remembered several stories of ghosts and devils and decided to sleep under the bench as the space felt safer, more compact and reassuring. He covered himself with a blanket and unknowingly fell into a nightmare-filled sleep. He dreamt of a tiger

chasing him and being unable to escape as his feet were stuck to the ground. He heard the scratching of tiger claws on the ground followed by a thud but couldn't open his eyes and felt stuck in the nightmare. When he finally opened his eyes, he tried reaching out for his grandmother for comfort but only touched the wooden bench leg. His fear intensified. Swami heard some rustling and saw a dark figure moving in the room. Assuming it was the devil who had come to take him away, Swami decided to fight back. As the dark shape reached near him, Swami hugged it with all his might and bit into its leg. The dark shape turned out to be a notorious burglar of the district.
