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Introduction:

This is a play featuring an old man Mr. Lamb and a small boy named Derry. Derry suffers from a complex. When one side of his face gets burnt, he always remains withdrawn and defiant. He doesn't like to be near people as he can't stand their uncharitable looks and remarks. Mr. Lamb himself has a tin leg but has a very positive attitude towards life and people. He shows the right way of judging men, matters and life to young Derry.

Summary:

1. Derry Enters Lamb's Garden

Derry walks slowly and cautiously through the long grass. He enters Lamb's garden. Mr. Lamb speaks to him when he is close at hand. Derry is startled. He is apologetic. He didn't know if there was anybody there. Mr. Lamb tries to make Derry comfortable. Mr. Lamb says that he can pick up crab apples. Derry need not go away on Mr. Lamb's account. Mr. Lamb doesn't mind who comes in the garden. The gate is always open. Derry did not need to climb over the wall of the garden. Derry says he didn't come there for stealing apples. Mr. Lamb assures him that he can stay there.

2. Derry's Burnt Face

Derry says that people are afraid of him. They look at his face and find it terrible and ugly. Even when, he himself sees his face in the mirror, he is afraid of himself. Mr. Lamb says that he will get the ladder and a stick and pull down crab apples. He makes jelly from them. Derry doesn't want Mr. Lamb to change the subject. He wants to talk about himself. Mr. Lamb thinks that perhaps Derry's face got burnt in a fire. Derry corrects him. Derry says he got acid all down on that side of his face and burnt it all way. The acid ate up his face.

3. Lamb Has a Tin Leg

Mr. Lamb is old. Derry is young. Derry has got a burnt face. Lamb has got a tin leg. Similarly, one green plant is called a weed and another a flower. All are life. Mr. Lamb lost his leg. Some kids call him "Lamey Lamb". A tin leg and a burnt face are not the only things to be taken notice of or to be stared at. There are so many other things like crab apples, weeds and sunflowers. They deserve our attention and Mr. Lamb enjoys life and people as much as he can.

4. Derry Suffers from a Complex

Derry says that people have already told him many fairy stories to console him. They say that it is not important what you look like. People tell these comforting lies only to console him. But Derry knows that he will not change. He will stay as a 'monstrous beast'. No one will kiss him ever. Only his mother and she too kisses him on the other side of his face. He doesn't care if nobody ever kissed him. Mr. Lamb asks Derry if he doesn't care to be kissed by pretty girls. Girls with long hair and large eyes. Will he not like to be kissed by the people he loves? Derry replies that no one will ever kiss and love him. He is grieved that he won't ever look different. Even when he grows as old as Mr. Lamb, he will look the same. He will still only have "half a face". Mr. Lamb replies that Derry may have a 'half face' but the world has got a 'whole face'. He should look at it.

5. Derry Indulges in Self-pity

Derry is obsessed with what people say and comment. People remind Derry that there are people even worse than him. They might be blind, dumb or may be mad by birth. Sometimes people can be very cruel. A woman looked at him. She said to another woman. "Look at that, that's a terrible thing". She told her that only a mother could love such a

face. Mr. Lamb advises Derry to keep his ears shut. Derry says that he doesn't like being close to people. He can't stand people staring at him and passing cruel comments about him.

6. Mr. Lamb Shows the Way

Mr. Lamb reminds Derry that he can't lock himself up in a room and never leave it. Then, he narrates to him the story of a man who was afraid of everything in the world. So he went into his room, locked the door and stayed there. A picture fell off the wall on to his head and killed him. Mr. Lamb says that he enjoys life as it comes. He sits in the sun and reads books. He is not fond of curtains. Mr. Lamb motivates Derry. Derry has got two arms, two legs, eyes and ears. He has got a tongue and also a brain. He can get on the way he wants like all others. And if he chooses, he can "get on better than all the rest". Derry asks "How?" Mr. Lamb replies that Derry can live the same way as he himself does. For him everybody is welcome. The gate is always open. Derry says that there are some people whom he hates. Mr. Lamb says that hatred is more harmful than a bottle of acid. Derry gets up and prepares to go. He says he will come back. Mr. Lamb says that generally people say so but never come back.

7. Derry Comes Back but Mr. Lamb Dies

Derry comes home. His mother warns him not to go back there. Derry assures her that she need not fear. Only an old man with a tin leg lives there. He has a huge house and a garden. He is Mr. Lamb. He says things nobody else has ever said. Derry runs to Mr. Lamb's garden. He opens the garden gate. He cries that he has come back. Suddenly, there is a crash. The ladder falls back, Mr. Lamb also falls down with it. He dies. Derry begins to weep. He goes on crying "Lamey-Lamb! I did come back".

Detailed Answer: Derry is a young boy who came to Mr. Lamb's garden. One side of his face had been burnt by acid.

- Q. 2. Why does Derry tell Mr. Lamb that he is afraid of seeing himself in the mirror in the story 'On The Face of It'? [CBSE, SQP II, 2013]
- Ans. Derry's face is burnt with acid. Derry says that people are afraid of him. They look at his face and find it terrible and ugly. So, he says that he too is afraid of himself when he sees his face in the mirror.
- Q. 3. What consolation did people give Derry when they saw his acid burnt face?

OR

How do people console Derry when they look at his face? [Foreign Set III, 2017]

- Ans. Value Points: people console him by quoting the fairy tale- 'Beauty and the Beast'

Detailed Answer: People often asked him to look at those people who were in pain, are brave,

never cry/never complain and don't feel sorry for themselves. They also asked him to think of those who were worse off. He was better off than those people who were blind, born deaf, or are confined to a wheel-chair, or are crazy and dribble.

Q. 4. How do people react to Derry's face?

- **Ans.** Value Points: they stare at him
 - feel afraid of him
 - pity him [CBSE Marking Scheme, 2017] 2

Detailed Answer: When people looked at Derry's burnt face, they kept staring at him. They often reacted as if they were afraid of him. Some of them pitied him and consoled him by saying sympathetic words.

- Q. 5. How did Mr. Lamb keep himself busy when it was a bit cool? [Delhi Set-I, II & III, 2012]
- Ans. Value Points: Gets a ladder and a stick and pulls down the crab apples / makes jelly / enjoys the humming of bees in his garden / sits in the Sun / reads books / makes toffee with honey.

Detailed Answer: When it's a bit cool, Mr. Lamb keeps himself busy by getting a ladder and a stick and pulling down the crab apples. He then makes jelly out of them. He keeps enjoying the humming of bees, reading books and sitting in the sun.

- Q. 6. What peculiar things does Derry notice about the old man, Lamb? [Outside Delhi Set-I, 2012]
- Ans. Value Points: That he leaves the gates always open / welcomes strangers / the way Derry was treated / received by Lamb / he spoke things that others never did / lives in a huge house and a garden without curtains.

Detailed Answer: Mr. Lamb always leaves his gates open to welcome strangers. He lived in a big house without curtains. Derry also found Mr. Lamb's conversation peculiar. He did not understand the questions Mr. Lamb asked him. He asked Derry to always keep his ears shut. Then, he told him the story of the man who locked himself in his room to escape from any kind of danger and died when a picture fell off the wall on his head and killed him.

Commonly Made Error

 Some students answer vague points about the nature of Lamb and not specific observations of Derry.

- Q. 7. Why does Derry stay away from people ? [Outside Delhi Set II, 2015]

OR

How did Derry's handicap damage his life ?
[Comptt., Outside Delhi Set I, 2015]
OR

Why does Derry say: "I'm not afraid. People are afraid of me?"

- Ans. Derry suffers from the complex that most of the physically impaired persons suffer from. He has become withdrawn and defiant. He has got a burnt face. He thinks that he is the ugliest person on the earth. People find his face very terrible. So he is not afraid of the people but they are afraid of him
- Q. 8. What changes took place in Derry when he met Mr. Lamb? [Comptt., Delhi Set I, 2015]
- Ans. When Derry met Mr. Lamb, his perspective towards life and himself changed. Derry had an acid burnt face due to which people either used to pity him or were scared of him. This had made Derry bitter and he had withdrawn into his own shell. He avoided meeting people, talking to them or being in anyone's company. He had come to Mr. Lamb's garden thinking that it was an isolated place.

But Mr. Lamb made him see a different side of life. He told him what is outside is not important, rather we should focus on what is inside. He made Derry see the beauty of life again. The sound of the rain, blossoming trees, chirping birds, everything was beautiful around him. Derry realized that it doesn't matter how he looked. What matters is how he treats himself and life. He became positive again.

Q. 9. In what sense is the friendship between Mr. Lamb and Derry fruitful?

Detailed Answer: Mr. Lamb is optimistic whereas Derry is pessimistic and has an inferiority complex. Mr. Lamb helps him overcome his inferiority complex and advises him not to pay much attention to what others thought about him. He asked him to enjoy life and the beauty of nature. He brings about a positive change in Derry.

The answer must state how each helped the other.

Q.10. Why does Derry's mother not want him to go back to visit Mr. Lamb?

- Ans. Being new to the area, Derry's mother knew little about Mr. Lamb. Moreover, he lived all alone and had no contact with the outside world. She had seen children tease him and had heard people talk adversely about him. So, she does not want Derry to be in his company.
 - Was new to the place and had not much personal information about him/ had heard adverse remarks made by people about Mr. Lamb/ Lamb leading a lonely life, no contact with outside world/ earlier, children used to tease and chase him, so would not be a healthy company for her son.

Mr. Lamb is very social. He keeps the gate open for everybody. Mr. Lamb has a tin leg, children tease him by calling "Lamey-Lamb". But he does not mind it. Derry is surprised to see a man who has a problem and suffers from no complex. Mr. Lamb motivates Derry to move forward in life.

Detailed Answer: Mr. Lamb and Derry both were handicapped. So, out of empathy Mr. Lamb understood Derry's plight and helped him to come out of his self-pitying habit.

- Q. 3. How is Derry's and Mr. Lamb's behavior and attitude different towards people because of their physical impairment? [CBSE, SQP 2014-15]

Ans. Value Points:

Derry's behaviour – avoids seeing and meeting people – as people afraid/avoid to look at him – ugly – call him poor boy - hates to talk to people – people unsympathetic and cruel.

Mr. Lamb's attitude – loves to meet and talk to people – garden house open to all children – children tease him – make fun of him – Mr. Lamb not troubled – not afraid and shy of his physical impairment. [CBSE Marking Scheme, 2014-15] 6

Detailed Answer: Mr. Lamb and Derry both are physically impaired, Derry has a burnt face whereas Mr. Lamb has an artificial leg, but they both are very different in their behavior and attitude towards life. Derry avoids seeing people because he believes that people are afraid of him, he hates talking to people because he thinks that they are unsympathetic and cruel towards him.

Mr. Lamb loves talking to people. He has a garden which is open to all people. Though children tease him, he gladly shares toffees with them. Mr. Lamb has a very optimistic outlook towards life. He is neither afraid nor shy of his physical impairment.

He allows himself to be alienated from the world. On the other hand, Mr. Lamb doesn't allow his physical disability to come in his way. He accepts life as it comes. He has a positive attitude towards life, things and people. He doesn't find solace in escapism. Children tease him by calling him "Lamey-Lamb" but he doesn't mind it. One of his legs was blown off in the war. But he is full of life and enjoys it to his best. He enjoys sitting in the sun, reading books and growing weeds and flowers.
