
A Letter to God





'A Letter to God' is a story about faith. It tells us about a simple poor farmer Lencho, who has tremendous faith in God. After a hailstorm ruins his corn crop, he writes a letter asking for a hundred pesos to tide him and his family over until the next crop was ready. He addresses the letter to God and gives it at the post office. At the post office after laughing at Lencho's naivety, the post master decides to help him. He gathers money from everyone he knows and even gives a part of his salary to collect seventy pesos. He places them in an envelope and addresses it to Lencho. The following week, Lencho comes to the post office and receives his letter. However, contrary to the postmaster's expectations, he becomes angry instead of being happy. Lencho immediately writes back to God complaining that though he must have sent the full hundred pesos, the post office officials have stolen thirty pesos and left only seventy pesos for him.






