- (14) (d) Acc. to 1st law of thermodynamics,  $\Delta U = q + w$   
 For isothermal process,  $\Delta U = 0$ ,  $\therefore q = -w$   
 For cyclic process,  $\Delta U = 0$ ,  $\therefore q = -w$   
 For adiabatic process,  $q = 0$ . Hence,  $\Delta U = w$   
 For expansion into vacuum,  $w = 0$ . Hence,  $\Delta U = q$ .  
 $\therefore$  only (d) is incorrect.

- (15) (c) From the question we see that the first reaction is exothermic and the second one is endothermic. Thus, if a mixture of oxygen and steam ( $H_2O$ ) is passed over coke and at the same time, temperature does not change, the composition should be such that  $\Delta H$  of both the reactions are numerically equal.

In the first reaction, consumption of  $\frac{1}{2}$  mole of  $O_2$  evolves 110 kJ of energy while in the second reaction, for 1 mole of steam ( $H_2O$ ), 132 kJ of energy is absorbed.

$$\therefore \text{Mole of } O_2 \text{ needed to evolve 132 kJ} = \frac{0.5}{110} \times 132 = 0.6$$

$\therefore$  Mole ratio of  $O_2$  and steam ( $H_2O$ ) = 0.6 : 1

- (16) (d) Let the molarity of KOH and  $HNO_3$  solutions is  $x$ .

$\therefore$  200 ml of  $x$  mole KOH solution

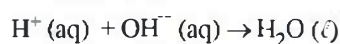
$$= \frac{200}{1000} \times x \text{ mole } OH^- \text{ ions}$$

$$= 0.2 \times x \text{ mole } OH^- \text{ ions}$$

Similarly, 200 ml of  $x$  mole  $HNO_3$  solution

$$= \frac{200}{1000} \times x \text{ mole } H^+ \text{ ions}$$

$$= 0.2 \times x \text{ mole } H^+ \text{ ions}$$



$$0.2x \quad 0.2x \quad 0.2x$$

Heat evolved during formation of 1 mole

$$H_2O = 57.1 \text{ kJ}$$

$\therefore$  Heat evolved during formation of  $0.2 \times x$  mole  $H_2O$

$$= 57.1 \times 0.2 \times x \text{ kJ}$$

However, given heat evolved = 3.426 kJ.

$$\therefore 57.1 \times 0.2x = 3.426 \text{ kJ}$$

$$\text{or } x = \frac{3.426}{57.1 \times 0.2} = 0.3 \text{ mole.}$$

- (17) (b)  $W = 2.303 nRT \log \frac{V_2}{V_1}$   
 $= 2.303 \times 1 \times 8.314 \times 10^7 \times 298 \log \frac{20}{10}$   
 $= 298 \times 10^7 \times 8.314 \times 2.303 \log 2$

- (18) (a) For this reaction  $\Delta n = 0$  thus  $\Delta E = \Delta H$ .

- (19) (b) Given number of moles = 1

Initial temperature =  $27^\circ\text{C} = 300\text{K}$

Work done by the system = 3 kJ = 3000 J

It will be (-) because work is done by the system.

Heat capacity at constant volume ( $C_v$ ) = 20 J / K

We know that work done

$$W = -nC_v(T_2 - T_1); 3000 = -1 \times 20 (T_2 - 300)$$

$$3000 = -20T_2 + 6000$$

$$20T_2 = 3000; T_2 = \frac{3000}{20} = 150\text{K}$$

- (20) (c) As the system is closed and insulated, no heat enters or leaves the system, i.e.  $Q = 0$ ;  $\therefore \Delta E = Q + W = W$ .

- (21) (d)  $W = 0$  is not true.

- (22) (d)

(1)  $H_2(g) \rightarrow 2H(g)$ . It involves breaking of bond between H-H which needs energy.  $\therefore \Delta H = +ve$

(2)  $H^+(aq) + OH^-(aq) \rightarrow H_2O(l)$ . It involves bond formation which results in release of energy.

$$\therefore \Delta H = -ve$$

(3)  $H(g) \rightarrow H^+(g) + e^-$ . This is ionization, which needs energy.

$$\therefore \Delta H = +ve$$

(4)  $H_2O(l) \rightarrow H_2O(s)$ . Phase transformation from (l)  $\rightarrow$  (s). It involves cooling. Hence,  $\Delta H = -ve$

$\therefore$  (d) is correct answer.

- (23) (d)  $KCl(s) + H_2O(l) \rightarrow K^+(aq) + Cl^-(aq)$   $\Delta_f H^\circ = ?$

1 mol excess

$$\Delta_f H^\circ = [\Delta_f H^\circ (K^+(aq)) + \Delta_f H^\circ (Cl^-(aq))] - [\Delta_f H^\circ (KCl)]$$

$$= [-251.2 + (-167.08)] \text{ kJ mol}^{-1} - [-437.6 \text{ kJ mol}^{-1}]$$

$$= -418.28 \text{ kJ mol}^{-1} + 437.6 \text{ kJ mol}^{-1}$$

$$\Delta_f H^\circ = +19.3 \text{ kJ mol}^{-1}$$

This process does not represent an ionisation reaction.

The process here involves dissolution of  $KCl(s)$  in water and formation of  $K^+(aq)$  and  $Cl^-(aq)$  by dissociation.

- (24) (a) As  $C_p > C_v$

$$\Rightarrow \left( \frac{dH}{dT} \right)_p > \left( \frac{dE}{dT} \right)_v \left( \because \left( \frac{dH}{dT} \right)_p = C_p \text{ and } \left( \frac{dE}{dT} \right)_v = C_v \right)$$

$$\text{Also } C_p - C_v = R \Rightarrow \left( \frac{dH}{dT} \right)_p - \left( \frac{dE}{dT} \right)_v = R$$

(28) (d) Values of state functions depend only on the state of the system and not on how it is reached.

(29) (b) In an isothermal process change in internal energy ( $\Delta E$ ) is zero (as it is a function of temperature).

$\therefore$  According to first law of thermodynamics

$$\therefore Q + w = \Delta E, \text{ hence } Q = -w \text{ (if } \Delta E = 0)$$

If a system undergoes a change in which internal energy of the system remains constant (i.e.,  $\Delta E = 0$ ), then  $-w = Q$ .

This means that work done by the system equals the heat absorbed by the system.

(30) (a) Zeroth law of temperature can also be summarized as two objects at different temperature in thermal contact with each other tend to move towards the same temperature.
